

Roy Jacobstein, M.D., M.P.H., is the Clinical Director of the RESPOND Project, managed by EngenderHealth. From 2003-2008 he was the Clinical Director of the predecessor ACQUIRE Project, and from 2002-2003 he served as EngenderHealth's Medical Director. Dr. Jacobstein has 30 years of experience in the design, delivery and management of clinical RH/FP, child health and public health services in low-resource settings, including eight years providing clinical RH care to inner-city adolescents in Washington, DC, and 15 years with USAID and USAID-funded initiatives providing program design, management, impact assessment, and expert technical review. He has worked on short-term assignments for EngenderHealth, Catholic Relief Services, Save the Children, USAID, the World Bank, and other international organizations in over 20 countries worldwide, including: Bangladesh, Bulgaria, Estonia, Ethiopia, Ghana, Hungary, India, Indonesia, Kazakhstan, Kenya, Kyrgyz Republic, Malawi, Mexico, Nepal, Pakistan, Rwanda, Thailand, and Turkey.

Dr. Jacobstein serves as an expert technical advisor to WHO in its generation and ongoing revision of the WHO *Medical Eligibility Criteria for Contraceptive Use*, the WHO *Selected Practice Recommendations for Contraceptive Use*, and the WHO *Global Family Planning Handbook*, and in its deliberations with respect to community-based access to injectable contraception. He also has been the co-chair of the USAID Working Group that developed the IUD Toolkit, the definitive electronic resource for the IUD, and is one of the core experts working to create an analogous implants toolkit. He has given contraceptive technology updates (CTUs) and other presentations at the USAID SOTAs for the LAC and E&E regions, as well as at the Global Health Council, APHA, White Ribbon Alliance, and University of Michigan. He is the author of numerous technical and programmatic briefs on a range of FP/RH subjects such as female sterilization, vasectomy, IUDs, hormonal implants, contraceptive security, fostering change in medical settings, and the status of family planning programs in Sub-Saharan Africa. He is the lead author of "Fragile, Threatened, and Still Urgently Needed: Family Planning Programs in sub-Saharan Africa" (*Studies in Family Planning*, June 2009), co-authored the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology's Practice Bulletin on "*Benefits and Risks of Sterilization*" and authored "Fostering Change in Medical Settings: Some Salient Considerations for FP Programs" (*IPPF Medical Bulletin*, Sept 2009). He is an Adjunct Professor of Public Health in the Department of Maternal and Child Health in the University of North Carolina's School of Public Health.
