The staff also provides a variety of services to eligible students, including learning strategy sessions and coaching.

The Writing Center is a free service available to students, faculty, and staff at UNC-Chapel Hill. Our tutors are friendly graduate students from a variety of academic disciplines who are specially trained in teaching writing. For students and faculty in the College of Arts and Sciences, we offer both 45-minute face-to-face sessions and an online tutoring system that allows you to submit writing and receive feedback via the web. Our face-to-face sessions take place by appointment. You can submit a draft to the online tutor at any time, but we can respond only during our normal working hours. Undergraduates can use Writing Center services twice a week; graduate students, faculty, and staff can work with us once a week. Graduate students in the professional schools can make up to one face-to-face appointment per week, on a same-day basis. Additional services for writers include the writing groups and ESL instruction, may be available.
