#### Principal Investigator

**A Randomized Trial of Wise Guys: The Next Level.** National Center for Injury Prevention and Control, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. RFA CE16-005. 09/30/2016-08/31/2020. \$1,800,000 total costs.

Our study will rigorously evaluate an ongoing Rape Prevention Education (RPE)-funded program, *Wise Guys: The Next Level (WGNL)*, which addresses SV perpetration by addressing known risk and protective factors. In Year 1, our research team will identify, refine, and document the core components and activities of *WGNL* and formalize its implementation. In Years 2 to 4, we will use a cluster-randomized design to randomize *WGNL* implementation by site and time. A total of 520 participants will be enrolled who will be evaluated at pre-program (baseline), immediate post-program (2-month), and 12-month follow-up. The evaluation is designed to measure the effect of *WGNL* on the primary outcome of preventing SV perpetration and, secondarily, on preventing dating violence, bullying, sexual risk behavior, and harassment. We will also document the implementation costs of *WGNL* to inform future research and SV prevention interventions.

#### **How do NC Courts Restrict Abusers' Access to Firearms: An Assessment of Firearm Confiscation Policies and Procedures Related to Domestic Violence Protective Orders?**

Jaimie Kimble Foundation for Courage. 06/01/2016-05/31/2017. \$25,000. This study will complement and supplement the data collection efforts for our ongoing study of DVPOs in North Carolina in order to collect additional data pertaining to the firearm surrender and confiscation process during and after DVPO hearings. We will then be able to link data about the judicial districts (e.g. characteristics of DVPO cases; DVPO denial rates, conditions contained in granted DVPOs) with their firearm-related policies and procedures in order make recommendations for policy and practice.

#### **An Assessment of DVPO E-Filing in North Carolina.**

UNC Injury Prevention Research Center Faculty Grant. 04/01/2016-05/31/2017. \$10,050. This assessment will examine whether, and in what ways, e-filing is improving the process for DVPOs, thereby helping the courts understand how their process impacts DVPO cases, and how that process can be improved. Improved utilization of DVPOs through E-filing has the potential to improve prevention of secondary DV victimization and its consequences in an already vulnerable population.

#### **Developing a Statewide Approach to IPV Screening in North Carolina Healthcare Networks.**

Subcontract with the North Carolina Coalition Against Domestic Violence. Office of Women's Health, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. ASTWH150030-10-00  
03/15/2016-7/31/2018. \$2,250,000 total costs. This project engages healthcare and community service providers to enhance IPV response in clinical settings. The project will result in the increased use of screening, brief interventions, and referrals in health care settings by using experts to develop a standard of practice based on best practices as defined by the World Health Organization Clinical and Policy Guidelines, and guidelines produced by the Institute of Medicine. By increasing the quality of screening, counseling, referral and follow up, this project will increase the access to services among currently underserved populations, and increase the physical and mental well-being of victims of domestic violence.

#### **Solidarity Groups to Facilitate Integration and Social Support among Newly-Arrived Congolese Refugees.**

NC TRACS. 09/01/2015-08/31/2016. \$2,000. This pilot study will create monthly psycho-educational "solidarity groups," for adult female Congolese refugees, led by a trained facilitator who is also a native Swahili speaker. These groups provide a safe space for women to share their concerns, while also addressing practical issues (e.g. navigating the local public transportation system), identifying needs for services, building trust among the women, decreasing isolation, and beginning to build local social connections and networks.

This study triangulates primary and archival data from multiple sources in order to: 1) describe variations in DVPO hearing processes and the provisions contained in the resulting orders; 2) quantify the level of adherence to DVPO best practices and the extent to which adherence varies among judicial districts; and 3) determine whether, after controlling for other factors, judicial districts that adhere more closely to DVPO best practices: a) have higher rates of granting DVPOs; and b) issue higher quality DVPOs.

To inform the ongoing debate over how to ensure that pregnant HIV-infected women and their infants receive vital services for the prevention of mother-to-child HIV transmission (PMTCT), we will test the effectiveness of an escalating scheme of small, conditional cash transfers (CCTs) to increase patient retention and service uptake. Additionally, we will examine how HIV-infected women process information they receive during antenatal care visits and how they perceive vertical transmission risk, in order to better understand how CCTs affect adherence to care.

**Judges' Decision-Making in DVPO Cases: A Pilot Study.** Faculty Small Grant from UNC Injury Prevention Research Center. 08/01/2012-01/31/2014. \$15,000 (direct costs).

There is a dearth of research about the multiple factors that influence judges' decisions to grant or deny a plaintiff a DVPO, and what conditions and provisions are included in orders that are granted. Our pilot study supports two formative research activities: 1) the revision and pilot testing of a structured court observation tool to be used to collect data during DVPO hearings; and 2) the development, pre- and pilot testing of a vignette-based survey instrument to be conducted with judicial officials who hear DVPO cases.
