For this project, we will increase awareness and knowledge of suicide prevention strategies and skills among injury and violence prevention professionals through in-person and remote academies, peer-learning, and strategic planning.

The Effects of Electronic Filing of Domestic Violence Protective Orders in a Pandemic. Submitted on May 19, 2021, in response to: O-OVW-2021-45006: FY 2021 Research and Evaluation Initiative Solicitation. November 1, 2021-September 30, 2023. \$450,000 total costs.

For the proposed project, we will leverage our eProtect study, an ongoing evaluation funded by the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW) examining electronic filing (e-filing) of DVPOs, to obtain real-time information about how the pandemic has impacted IPV survivors' access to community responses, specifically access to domestic violence protective orders, one of the few IPV-related interventions that has evidence of effectiveness for secondary prevention. E-filing is an innovative method of decreasing barriers to DVPOs. Documenting the utility of e-filing during an emergency such as the COVID-19 pandemic, may foster statewide, regional, and national scale-up of this innovation.

Project RESTART (Restorative, Effective Solutions Toward Accountability, Responsibility and Treatment). Submitted on April 27, 2021, in response to O-NIJ-2021-45009: Research and Evaluation on Violence Against Women, FY 2021. November 1, 2021-September 30, 2023, \$600,000 total costs.

Project RESTART will address identified gaps in our knowledge and the extant evidence base about interventions for IPV perpetrators. In consultation with state and national experts and our community partners, we will follow an evidence-based phased approach to intervention design to develop a restorative justice-based model DVIP intervention that we will then pilot test in a community setting to assess its acceptability, feasibility, and preliminary efficacy. Based on our findings, we will offer recommendations for improving DVIPs on a state level to the North Carolina (NC) Commission on Domestic Violence, the regulatory body that certifies court mandated DVIPs in NC, as well as to the national partners with whom we are collaborating.

Structural factors impacting firearm victimizations, injuries, and death (STRIDE): The role of policy and COVID-19. Ranapurwala, S.I., Principal Investigator. Submitted on April 30 to the National Institutes of Health in response to PAR-21-192. September 1, 2021-August 31, 2024, \$1,498,851.00 total costs.

We will use six large national data sources from all 50 US states, and advanced analytic methods, including synthetic controls combined with controlled interrupted timeseries (CITS), directed acyclic graphs, and quantitative bias analyses, to overcome the limitations of previous studies and conduct a robust evaluation of four state firearm laws in the US. We will evaluate the impact of the four laws and the COVID-19 pandemic and associated state stay-at-home orders on the incidence of firearm victimizations, injuries, and deaths; evaluate effect measure modification by age, gender, race/ethnicity, and other demographics at the individual and structural levels; and conduct quantitative bias analyses to examine the impact of potential misclassification and unmeasured confounding on the study results. Impact of firearm policies on victimizations and injuries has not been examined before, and this study will be the first to do so, especially in light of structural disparities and COVID-19.

Malawi Trauma Research and Injury Prevention (M-TRIP) Training Program. Charles, A., PI. Submitted on April 15, 2021, in response to RFA-TW-21-003 (Fogarty Global Trauma and Injury Research Training Program D43). September 1, 2021-August 31, 2026.

This goal of this proposal is to establish The Malawi Research and Trauma Prevention (M-TRIP) program, a collaboration between UNC (Department of Surgery and IPRC) and the University of Malawi. Our program acknowledges the significant but addressable gaps in trauma research training capacity and provides focused strategic investment to leverage Malawi's exceptional research environment. With the high burden of traumatic injuries in sub-Saharan Africa, a continuous reduction in trauma-related morbidity and mortality can only occur through ongoing research relevant to a specific patient population and contextual injury prevention interventions.

Strengthening Empirical Evidence for Domestic Violence Court Watch Programs through a Process Evaluation. Hoffman, C., PI. Submitted on May 17, 2021, in response to O-OVW-2021-45006: Research and Evaluation Initiative Solicitation. November 1, 2021-October 31-2023.

The purpose of the proposed process evaluation is to provide the first empirically-tested instrument for court watch programs and develop best practices for other jurisdictions. Refining our data collection instrument and training protocols/materials through a process evaluation will allow us to describe, assess and improve upon our work, resulting in a data-informed instrument and accompanying training materials that can be easily adapted for other jurisdictions' court watching programs.
