ACADEMIC ROLE STATEMENTS

RESEARCH STATEMENT

What has distinguished my work within the nursing science community is a more focused concentration on ‘upstream’, social determinants of health that relate to employment and employment mandates either within, or *at the intersection of* policies, systems, and programs in the U.S. Within this context, the health outcomes of interest in my research reflect psychological stress, functional ability/limitations, and chronic disease symptom severity, self-management, and comorbidity. My early work focused on understanding the stress and health challenges faced by women as they tried to leave welfare and move into employment. More recent studies have applied a community-based participatory research (CBPR) approach to develop and test a public health nurse case management intervention for women as they transition from welfare into employment, which resulted in positive health and employment-entry gains. I have since extended this work to examine chronic disease self-management program efficacy for lower-to-middle wage workers, test multi-level interventions for unemployed populations, and incorporate theory and methods that reflect complex systems science, transdisciplinary team science, and dissemination science approaches.

TEACHING STATEMENT

I teach courses across undergraduate and graduate program levels, with an emphasis on PhD education and courses related to public health nursing. In general, my approach to teaching is guided by principles of *transformative pedagogy*, whereby I act as a facilitator to guide students in experiencing structural shifts in their basic assumptions or dominant ways of thinking. This type of pedagogy is fundamentally distinguished from *transmitter* models of teaching, where the faculty member is presumed to hold all expertise and ‘deliver’ (or transmit) knowledge to students.

SERVICE STATEMENT

My service contributions are made at the school, university, professional organization, and discipline levels. Regardless of the focus of the committee or group, I strive to model equity, substance, and integrity as I engage with others in work that is not intended to benefit any one individual, but the greater collective body, or good. To do this, I embrace principles of deliberative democracy, which essentially drive the peer-review process and the basis of functional, productive shared governance models.

ENGAGED SCHOLARSHIP STATEMENT

Engagement with members who comprise, or affect populations disadvantaged by their social or economic position is fundamental to all of the work that I do. I conduct my scientific work using a community-based participatory research (CBPR) approach, and direct my teaching to engage with real-world, community problems whenever possible. As do others in public health, I view engaged scholarship not as an optional component of my work to reduce health inequities, but central.
